

All families have some level of dysfunction, it is only the degree and type and how the family members are able to deal with it. It is sad that one entire family self destructed while another was able to cope and how one wife/mother stayed in a marriage to save her children. It also amazes me how one could come out of poverty and lack of support to attend well regarded colleges and most important, build a productive, satisfying life. Gutsy to be able to write about yourself and your family in such an honest manner. Despite all the stress and mayhem, many parts had me laughing aloud.

A wonderful book that I just could not put down. This great story by Gloria Norris provides both relatable themes of coming of age but also mindboggling stories of a small town. Growing up, we all had that one person we looked up to, an older sibling, aunt, family friend. For Gloria it was smart, sassy, beautiful Susan. "KooKooLand" is such a melding of language, story, personality and era, it's as if Damon Runyon

had a granddaughter who came bouncing out of the crib pounding the colorful vernacular of her

particular time and place onto a computer keyboard. Can't wait for the movie.

Kookooland is a page turner in the best sense. You are both mesmerized and horrified by

nine-year-old Gloria's ability to report on her frightening childhood. Her prose is quick and precise,

her dialogue perfectly describing her father, his violent criminal friends and the women (sister,

mother, schoolmates) who both terrorize and educate her. The adult reader is constantly applauding

her ability to successfully navigate this landscape. And, yet, this is a memoir filled with love and

humor - quite a feat considering the subject matter. Kookooland is at its heart (and it has a very full

heart) a story of triumph.

This was my book club's July pick and it was the rare book that we ALL loved! It's a memoir, but

reads like a novel. The setting is only a short distance from my home, but the story is universal. A

hardscrabble upbringing with some extremely unique and tragic peripheral events thrown in equals

a compelling story, and a narrator - 9 year old Gloria - you can't help but root for. Highly

recommended.
