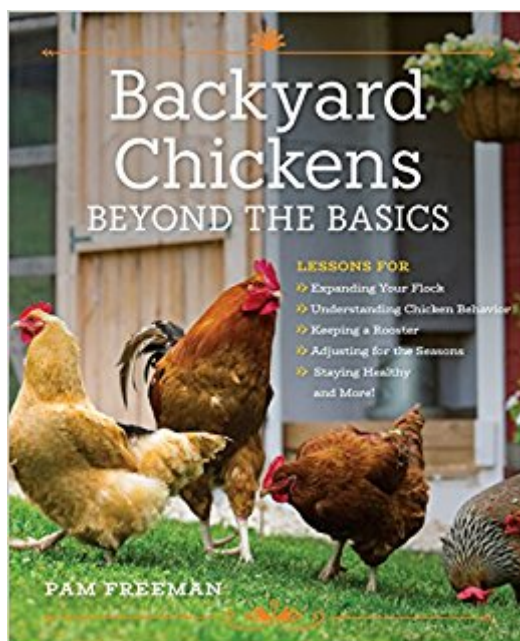

What do you do when you collect eggs and discover: lash eggs, calcium deposits, soft eggs, eggs within eggs, or wrinkled eggs? As someone who has not only read nearly every chicken keeping book in print, but also written books on raising poultry myself, I don't necessarily expect to learn a lot these days from new books coming out. That doesn't mean I don't still enjoy reading books about our favorite feathered friends. I mean who doesn't? Pam's book however is different. I found myself not only enjoying the beautiful photography, but also Pam's easy, friendly way of writing AND picking up some great tips.
