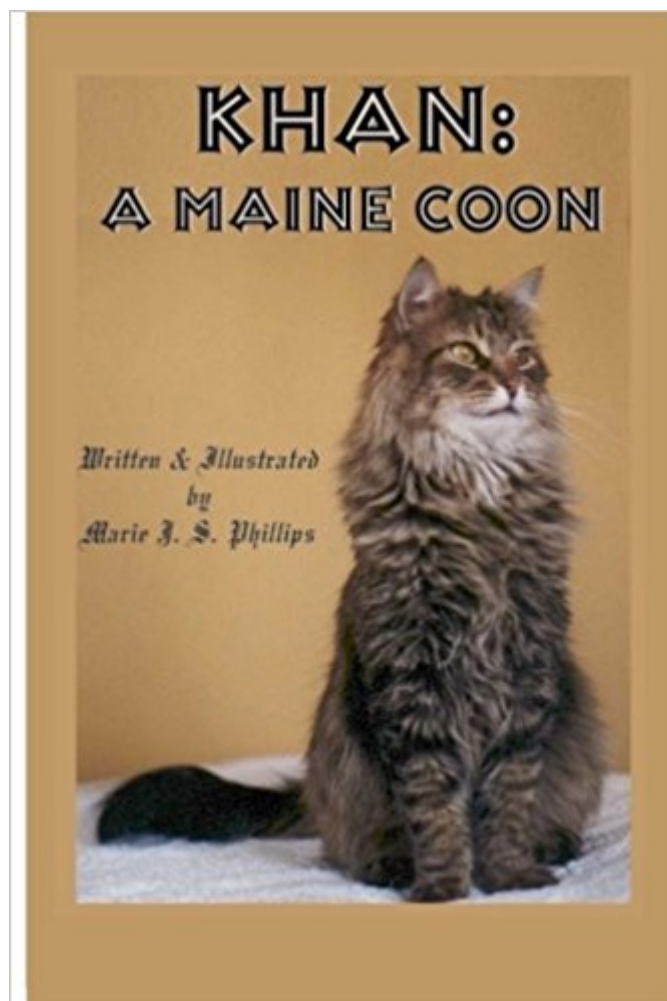


The book was found

I got interested in it because I am now a guardian of a Maine Coon/domestic longhair mix. As I got farther into the book, though, I felt like I was understanding how Khan and his housemates felt, that is, how my own cats past and present felt. That was something I always wanted to know.
