

This book is a dissapointment. Chapters are arranged in groups that are very vague. What really is a shrub as opposed to a tree or a large herb. So to have chapters called Trees, Shrubs, and Vines are of limited value. Then why did the author dedicate chapters to Heliconia, hibiscus, Protea etc. It is difficult to find specific plants with this arrangement. The book is also full of many colour photos. This is good but too many photos are useless for determining diagnostic characteristics of various plants. They are either blurred, or are taken so far off that all you see is an outline of a tree. I keep the book in my collection of botany books but rarely use it for reference.

I was searching for a book like this one. I'm originally from the Washington, D.C. metro area, retired, and moved to FL. I have acquired several tropical plants and the information in this book gave me tips to keep my tropical plants thriving.

Not my favourite book of its kind on the market . some photos leave a lot to be desired in particular. On the otherhand a reasonable, brief, compendium of the usual tropical plants.Sorry I don't think this is special or a "must have"

This book relies heavily on the pix for its value. In general terms this is fine - but the quality of some of these pix and the reproduction disappoints and leaves much to be desired. Handy - but not my most favourite tropical plant book !
