

Dan Suzio is a professional wildlife photographer with a special fondness for amphibians, reptiles, and the deserts of the American southwest. He is also known for his photos of the birds and other wildlife of Costa Rica, and of groundbreaking herpetological research in East Timor. He began photographing nature and wildlife more than forty years ago, and has continued refining his approach, always aiming for a simple composition that will capture the spirit of the individual as well as the species. He describes his work as that of a portrait photographer, using the same techniques of lighting, composition, and color to reveal a glimpse of each animal's "personality." Suzio "has an astounding ability to capture natural situations and spontaneous action while also achieving the artistic composition, color, and sharpness of detail I associate with studio work," says Dan Rademacher, Editorial Director of Bay Nature magazine. Publisher, editor, and photo industry consultant Ann Guilfoyle says that Suzio's images "are marked by a deep fascination with his subject" and invite the viewer to "take a close, involved look." Since 1978, Dan Suzio's photographs have appeared regularly in a wide variety of books, magazines, and natural history museums.

As a professional photographer, I run photography workshops in Death Valley every year. As part of my workshop, I was looking for an all-inclusive resource on the area to give to my participants so that they have background on the area, as well as to help them prepare for our time there. After previewing many books, this is the best one by far. While it is a photographer's guide, it has so much more than that. I feel great knowing my participants are reading it because I think they are truly prepared for not only all of the beauty they are about to encounter, but are also prepared on all of the practical fronts. He includes tips on staying safe in such an extreme landscape, and gives great advice on gear and how to pack. If you are headed to spend time in Death Valley, this is the book to read. Thanks, Dan, for creating such a comprehensive resource that is not only extremely helpful, but also incredibly enjoyable to read.

I have the other photo guide to DV, and it is not bad. This book, however, appears to cover more ground, literally. For example, it covers several places along the Titus Canyon road (which is spectacular, btw).
