

Many examples are presented; for instance, while we all have many of the same body parts, those parts come in different shapes and sizes. The author provides an explanation of some of the causes of similarities

and differences, such as genetics. Her concluding message is that no matter how different we may be, we all have feelings and that it is wrong to use differences put people down. Westcott's signature child-friendly cartoon illustrations support and expand the theme of the text. The book, even-though it is only 40 pages long, does have a lot of text on each page. Because of the length of time it takes to actually read, and the subject it is covering, I would say this book is more for children aged between 6-10 years. Although younger children may just like to look at the illustrations, rather than read the book, as these too show that people are different.
