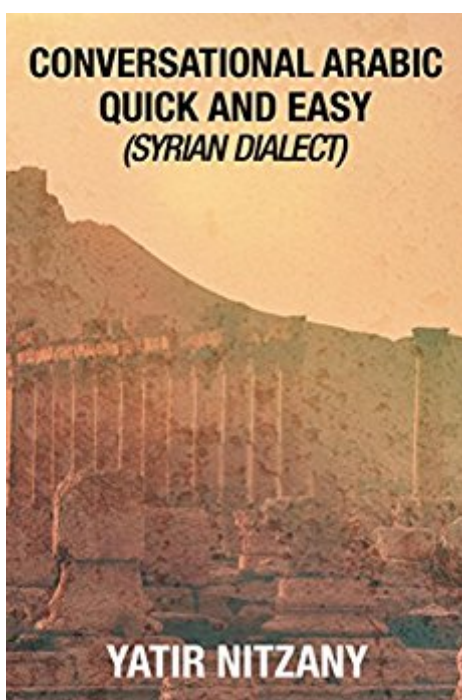

The purpose of my method is solely to give you the tools to create your own sentences in order to become conversational, while in regards to grammar, pronunciation, etc., you are on your own! Like the book a lot, it helped me be conversational in Arabic and I am able to speak with my Arab neighbors in my building using the words from this book.

Really interesting approach! I'm not quite sure about pronunciation, but I'm hoping this will help me learn the Syrian dialect of Arabic.

While I love the Nitzany concept of "Conversational" language books for English speakers, this is a book searching for an editor. There are some very significant typos and whole sentences out of place. E.g., presenting the word for no as the word for "to" (p. 18 - just as in his Lebanese Dialect

counterpart book on p. 18), and placing the feminine form of "Are you without them today?" as if it meant "Sometimes I am with him" on p. 17. This is inexcusable. Worse, for someone starting out in Syrian Arabic, there is no explanation of the sounds of the English transliterations, and many are not easily guessed because of the many sounds of the English vowels. E.g., Mr. Nitzany presents the word for "I" as "Ana". One couldn't possibly guess from this spelling that the first "a" has the sound of the "e" in "end". Without an accompanying audio version or a Syrian English-speaker to provide the Syrian dialect's sounds and correct the typos and misplaced sentences, I would not recommend this book.
