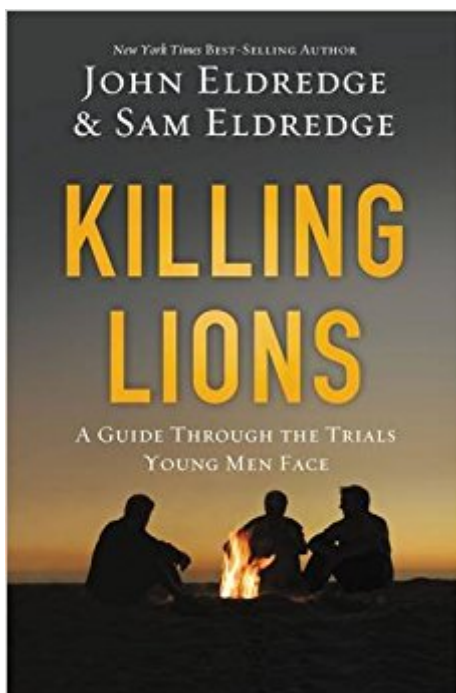

I am a 36 year old man and I found this book to be very helpful as a future dad of a boy. It touches areas that were personal to me and found some answers to some of my questions. I don't have it all figured out so I honestly can say I did take some good things from this book. It is also a good book to keep to remind me of the struggles my boy will face. Chapter 8 is the one that spoke to me the most because I still ask the same questions. I recommend it. I'm not giving it 5 stars because I can't say I LOVED it but I really liked it and I recommend it. Give it a try.

This book by Sam and John Eldredge is a conversation between father and son about reaching one's manhood, and the difficult journey of getting through college, finding a career, and entering marriage, while walking with God and listening to Him. There are many 'Wild at Heart' themes here as John relates them to Sam's growth and journey. Although there is some repetition, the 'Wild at Heart' themes are clarified in this young man's journey. This book is definitely geared to the young man and his early struggles in life, but some of the themes caught my attention for me having been through a previous marriage and career changes while trying to walk with God. Sam's lessons are relevant in many different seasons of a man's life to help clarify the past and give hope to the future. I have even thought there may be some lessons from the book my daughter can take from this as

she leaves college into her first job and career. There is an excellent chapter on prayer, praying against evil and praying against the noise of the evil one, which is very beneficial and well worth reading and following daily. Many of the Eldredge books incorporate the Daily Prayer and Prayer for Sexual Healing as does this one. I took away much from the book, and knocked it down a star for some of its redundancy with other Eldredge books. This won't matter if you are new to 'Wild at Heart' and this will be a five star book for you, if you have a Christian background. Again, I think the book is a good one for those familiar with other Eldredge books for Christian men in all seasons of their lives.

John and Sam address these issues in the context of a father-son conversation that every young man, including myself, a man about to turn 50, wishes he could have with his father. Career, dating, marriage, purpose, politics, social issues all come into better focus as Sam exposes his internal struggles, the struggles that all of us face as men. John responds as a wise and informed father, who has himself been fathered by God. The book is full of hope and direction! I have purchased 20 of these books and will pass them out to the men I have been entrusted with. I can highly, highly recommend this latest book and all of the books penned by the Eldredge family of writers.
