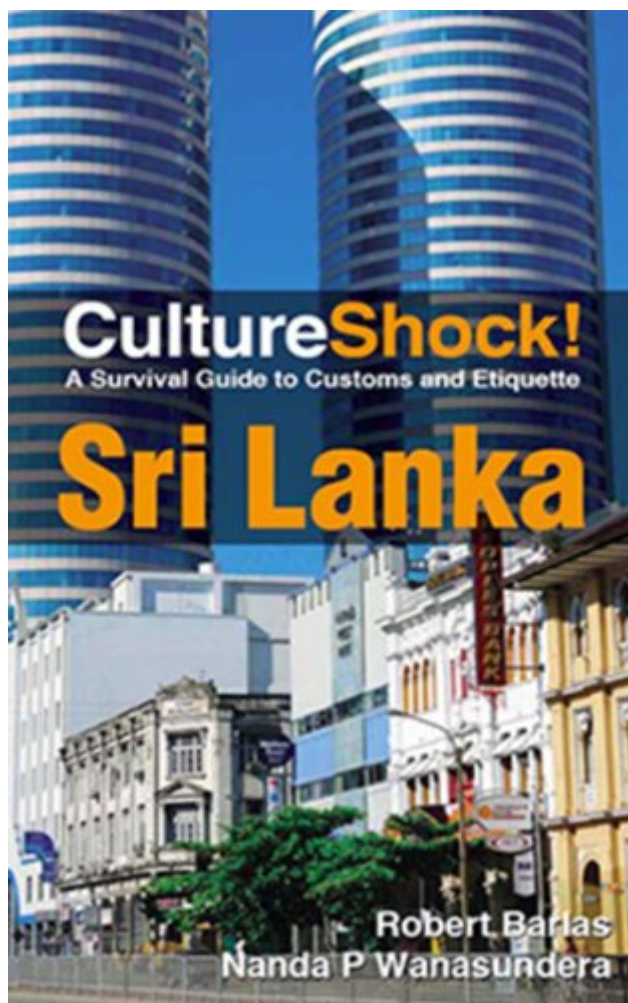

(reality the figure is much higher) Thank God I was able to learn the Truth after watching

While planning for a journey through South Asia, I've been reading everything on can on Sri Lanka. CULTURESHOCK! SRI LANKA is one of the few widely available guides to the culture of the country, and I'm happy I read it.The CultureShock! series is mainly intended for people relocating to a country for a lengthy period of time, and indeed you'll find a chapter on doing business and advice on hiring household servants. Nonetheless, there's much here that will prove interesting and helpful to the culturally curious traveler. For example, the section on food provides more detail than many guidebooks, and besides just listing delicacies, it gives you an idea of how the average person in Sri Lanka eats. I feel fortunate to have read the guide's presentation of the daily rhythms of Sri Lankan life, as now I know I should rise at dawn to join the locals and not hope for any real nightlife. A nice touch in the book is a series of quotations from Robert Knox, an Englishman who lived on the island for two decades from 1659. These show that much of Sri Lankan culture remains timeless, just as its cities may seem very Western at times.The 2006 edition is the first, so you needn't worry about CultureShock! selling an antiquated edition in a new cover, as they have sometimes done. If you're planning a journey to the Land of Serendipity, this guide will entertain you.

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
