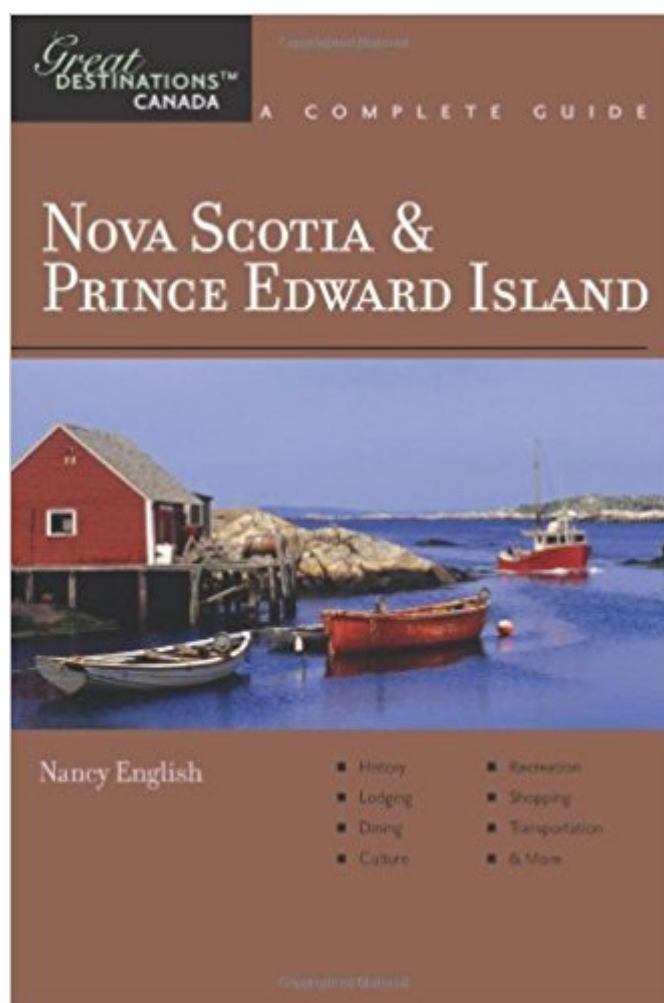


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# Explorer's Guide Nova Scotia & Prince Edward Island: A Great Destination (Explorer's Great Destinations)

Great travel book.

This is an old-fashioned style of guidebook, heavy on descriptions of lodging and restaurants. No color photographs of local scenes and stingy with black and white photographs. If you are the type of traveler who travels from bed to bed and meal to meal then this may be for you. If landmarks and scenic points are your greater interest find another guide book. I also did not like the way the book is laid out. Specific towns are not featured, rather an area is grouped with several towns together and you must page back and forth because towns are mixed together. It made me out of sorts to read it. Peggy's Cove, for example, a scenic little town, is given no paragraph let alone page to itself, and if

you wanted to see what was in Peggy's Cove you'd need to look in the index, find the page and then read the entire page to find a reference to Peggy's Cove (buried in the text). This type of travel guide is useless to me.

What's more fun than flipping through a guidebook and picking out the inns and restaurants you might go to when you get to your destination? Start your vacation before your vacation with Nancy English's Nova Scotia & Prince Edward Island: A Complete Guide. I trust this book because English's other guidebook, *Chow Maine, Chow Maine: The Best Restaurants, Cafes, Lobster Shacks & Markets on the Coast, Second Edition* was right on the money.
