


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Spoonbread & Strawberry Wine: Recipes And Reminiscences Of A Family

The book is a wonderful testament to a family's ancestry. Not only do you learn about this wonderful African American family from Civil War era until present times, but you experience who they were/are through their stories and recipes. For anyone who loves history, ancestry, and food, this book is a pure treasure. You will find recipes for game, beauty treatments, homemade wine, as well as downhome cooking. And you will be impressed by the academic and social achievements of this family - many who were college graduates - during the "Jim Crow" era and pre-American Civil Rights movement. And again, you learn about each personality through their recipes and traditions tied to the foods they love. Just wonderful!!!

Ok - Most of the recipes look great and I've had my heart set on a few - especially the 'Okra Succatash' on page 317 (I love okra!). Anyway, as I was looking at the ingredients and reading through the recipe - it calls for 4 ham hocks, 2 lbs string beans,1 medium onion, sliced and slices halved and salt to taste....ok - where's the rest of the ingredients? According to the directions there's also supposed to also be new potatoes, corn cut off the cob and for heaven sake - OKRA - there's no OKRA in the 'Okra Succatash'! Now how can it be 'Okra Succatash' if there's no Okra?!.......So I don't know what to say....I tried finding a phone # or email where I could get the rest of the recipe - looks like it just ain't happening! So.....unless I can get the rest of this recipe - it's getting a '3' Stars! Sorry!

This book should be a gift for every young woman as a symbolic rite of passage. My daughter will receive my late mother in laws copy as it was a gift from my husband to his mother many years ago.
