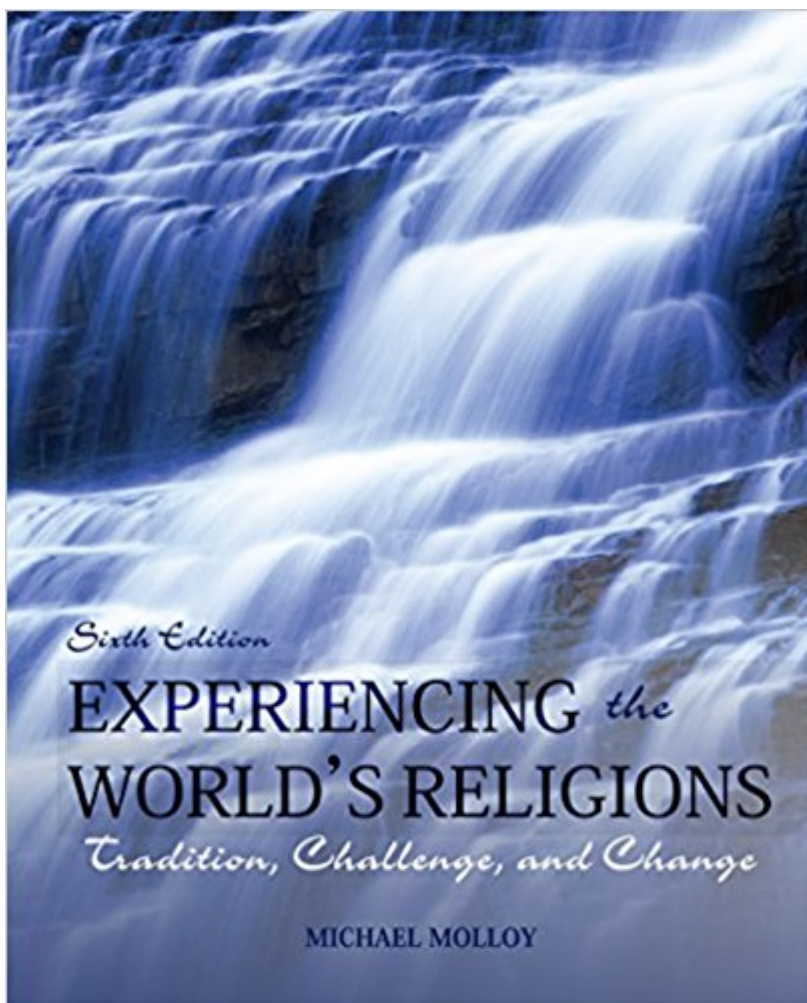


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Experiencing The World's Religions Loose Leaf

This book explains the religions that it covers well enough. You will learn plenty by reading it. There are some places where the author inputs his own political ideology, which is why it only gets 3 stars. If you can overlook that then it's written well and you will have no trouble understanding it. He's also into name dropping the names of dead psychologists, philosophers and artists. Why? I have no idea. Picasso's opinion of African masks has next to nothing to do with the topic of the religion. This is a loose leaf book. A note: There's almost no difference between this book and the one that came before it. The main difference was the images. I bought this and compared it to a scan of the previous edition that I found online and I was unable to find any significant differences. That said, I manage to get this pretty cheap when lowered the price for one day, and I sold it back to the university bookstore for 80% of what I paid for it. Needless to say, I was satisfied with that arrangement. Apparently the bookstores don't always buy these loose leaf books. did not offer me anything for it. I ended up not even needing it.

This is a standard college level Survey of World Religion book, and does a good job of disseminating the info you need to know without being terribly dry. I read a good eighty percent of this for my class, and the tone of the book is not overtly preachy nor is it watered down. I did take issue with some of the PC speak in the book, but at a collegiate level, that's to be expected. All in all, not a bad book.

ook was alright and the version cost to rent was around 29 dollars. However when it arrived it turned out to not actually be the paperback version rather one of those "textbooks" that lack any binding and instead has holes for a 2 or 3 ring binder. Maybe I missed that in the details but I could have sworn paperback meant just that. As a result several pages have ripped rings and can't be held together properly as well turning pages is awkward and must be done slowly. Make sure this version works for you if you see a way lower price to rent.

However, unbeknownst at the time of purchase, this book is incompatible with Kindle on iPhone which I could cope with if it ran properly on the Mac version of the application. Every time I open this text in Kindle, the program quits unexpectedly. I have been able to read the text, but with random closures and with difficulty saving my progression. Upon reopening, it often reverts to several saves ago. .
