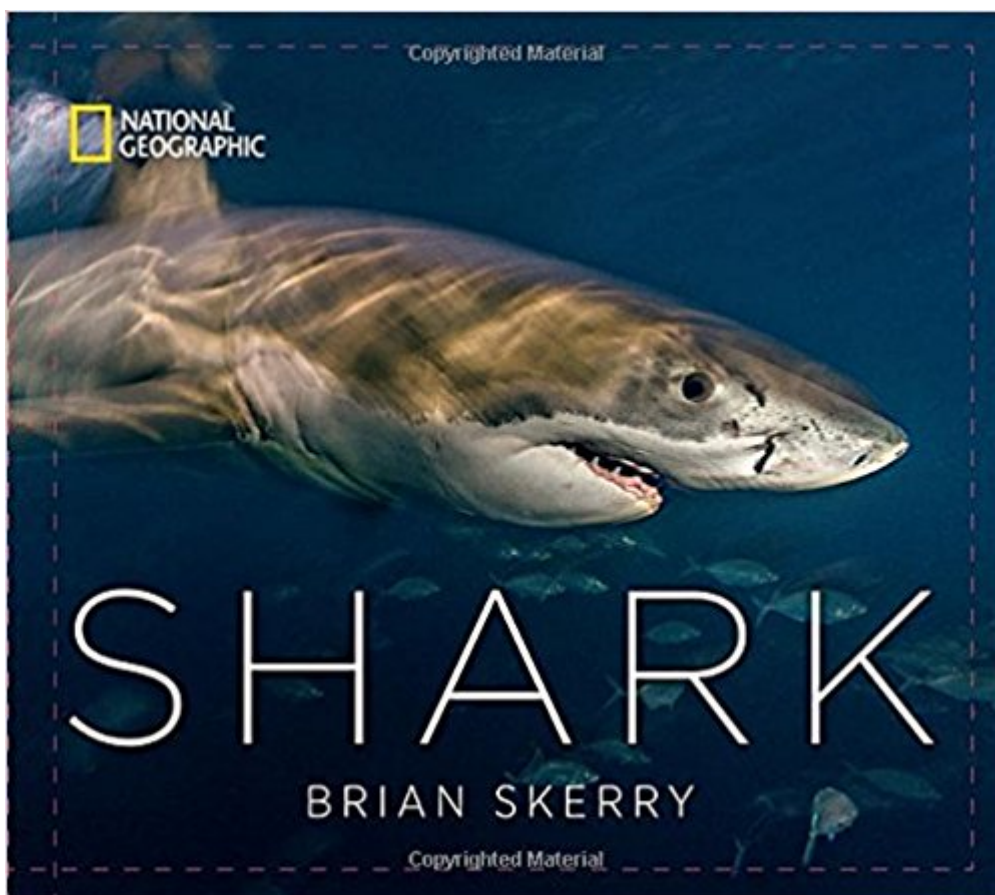

If you have any interest in photography, particularly underwater images, you must get this book by the master, Brian Skerry. The text, by Mr. Skerry and National Geographic writers, is excellent, informative and spellbinding. The pictures, however, are the real reason this book stands out from any of the many books about sharks. Skerry is an artist with the camera. He captures not just the power and grace of sharks, but the poetry and beauty of the most feared and maligned species of sharks. And he shows us why the fear is misplaced, and rather than be maligned, sharks should be respected and engender awe. This is the perfect book for any season, but especially in summer, not just for the coffee table, but for reading an engrossing story illustrated by the master.
