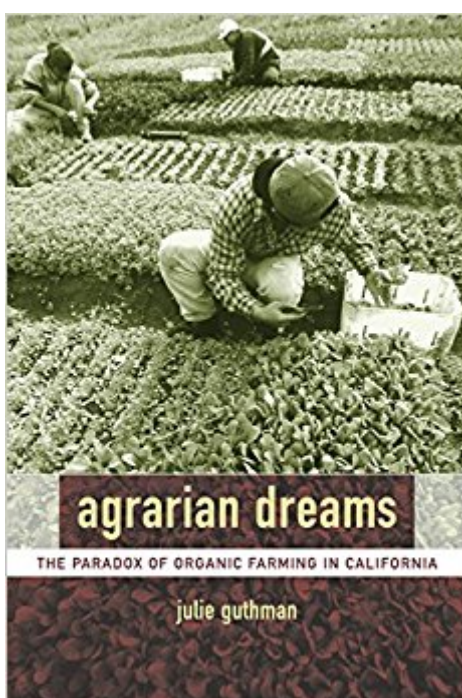

Many of us probably suspected organic farming was not all that it claimed to be and that given how agriculture has become industrialized and corporatized, we should not expect anything very good from it. This book follows the rise and more-or-less fall of the organic movement amongst California growers from the 1960s to its publication in 2004. Although the effect is very much like that of an expose, it isn't written like one. Instead, Guthman takes a rather flat political economy perspective. She stresses how growers choosing to adopt organic methods were sometimes motivated by idealism, especially in the beginning, but increasingly responded to economic concerns, like the desire to capture 'super-profits' (the killing to be made by early entrants to market before rivals see how much money they're making and follow suit). She shows how organic growers were growing a particular place in a particular time and how they could not -- assuming they even tried -- escape the legacies that entailed, like dependence on cowed and thus cheap immigrant labor. Likewise, Guthman follows the tensions and debates surrounding the competition amongst certification organizers. The intertwined history of growers and certifiers is leagues from the traditionally rosy image of organics without turning into a screed. This makes the book very provocative, and if it weren't for the occasional bursts of academic prose, it might have found a much wider audience. In a roundabout way, it did though: it clearly influenced Michael Pollan's *The Omnivore's Dilemma*.
