

Recommended to me by a therapist. We have spent almost a year with my teen son who has been involved with a controlling girlfriend. Their relationship has torn our family into shreds. The book helped me in several ways: how do we pray to God? Do we think of our own concerns? We need to find solitude and listen to God speaking to us. It is hard in our society to be in solitude and quiet. We need to hear God tell us, "I love you." We need to go to God when we are angry, tired, whatever is inside us. As a Catholic, I have found our adoration chapel a place to find that solitude. And to sit and listen to God talking to me.

I have read other publications of Fr. Ronald Rolheiser and thoroughly enjoyed them, prompting me to purchase this book. It has not been a disappointment... he is a very deep and holy man, yet he is able to express his thoughts and ideas in language that doesn't require a dictionary, thesaurus nor a degree in theology. That being said, I don't think this book can be considered a primer on prayer, but rather for those who want to bring more depth to their prayer life, to deepen the intimacy of their relationship with God.

What a gift to all of us are this author's inspiring works. This is also well worth the read and will be re-read again and again, as well.

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
