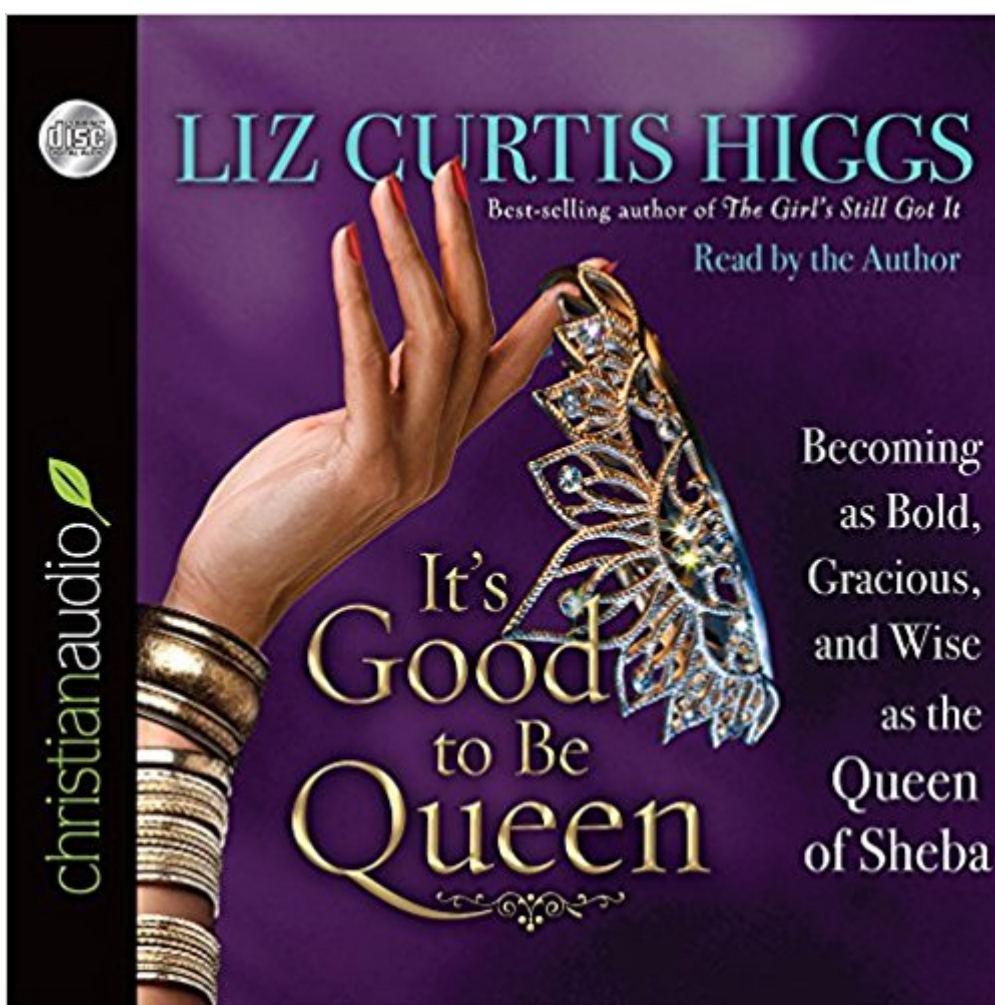

Our study group just finished this Bible Study. We enjoyed it for the most part but there were a few times we thought 'that was a stretch to get that point'. The online videos that were to go with each week's lesson were hard to listen to because 1) the mic was not always on the 'guest' of the week & 2) you never see the guest's face. Liz Curtis Higgs does a staggering amount of research for her books. Her microscopic examination of the Queen o Sheba reveals a boatload of Biblical treasure. In addition to scripture references from throughout the Bible, she includes comments from theologians and even quotes from other more recent queens. One is able to receive her encouragements and admonitions because, rather than looking down from some exalted position, she speaks from the depth of her own life experiences. She makes queenly qualities seem attainable for us all! Her keen sense of humor and willingness to efface herself become poignant verbal embraces for her readers.

The format of this book is perfect to use over and over to work on specific character traits you choose to study and pray about. Liz uses history, personal experience, the Word, and the experiences of her online girlfriends to help us learn more about ourselves. It's good to be truthful... and Liz is in this book. The biblical account of this queen is not an erotic romance and I love that Liz

sticks to the Truth.

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
